Definitions

- C. its author(s) are not interested in achieving knowledge as accurately as possible, but in advancing a particular view of the world.
- D. Is a source that you can safely accept as offering a high quality, expert and accurate view of a topic.
- E. Means repeating a result in other research, or a claimed fact being independently observed by others.
- F. When the information provided is closely related to an argument in terms of its premises and conclusion.
